why Choose Well?

This leaflet is a general guide to help you decide which NHS Service to use.

Think carefully before going straight to the Emergency Department (A&E)

Choose Well so that:

- Busy Emergency Services can help those who need them most urgently
- Essential treatment is given in the shortest possible time
- You get the right treatment in the right place

Be prepared by having essential medicines available in a child safe cupboard i.e.

- Pain killing medicine i.e. Paracetamol
- · Anti-diarrhoeal medicine
- · Rehydration mixture
- · Indigestion remedy
- Plasters
- Thermometer

Choking. Chest Pain. Blacking Out. Blood Loss. Serious Injury. Emergency Department (A&E) or 999
Emergency Department (A&E) can treat
people who are very ill or badly injured.
You should always call 999 in a life
threatening emergency – if someone is
seriously ill or injured and their life is at risk.

When you dial 999 you may not get an emergency ambulance response. The Welsh Ambulance Service has a range of staff and volunteers that will come and treat you, depending on the seriousness of the situation.

Cuts. Bites. Sprains.

Minor Injuries Unit

Minor Injuries Units are located throughout Wales. They can treat minor injuries and give health advice.

GP and Out of Hours Service

Pharmacist

Visit a pharmacy when you are suffering from a common health problem which does not require being seen by a nurse or doctor.

Your local pharmacist can give you advice

on common illnesses and the medicines you need to treat them. They may help if you have run out of your normal repeat prescription. They can also provide Emergency Contraception.
